PUBLIC POLICY

Early Childhood Education Update

As we gear up for the elections this fall, it is important that we prepare ourselves to ask candidates what their agendas are on early childhood education policies. It is vital that we elect leaders who know the issues facing children and that we ask them how they would help children if elected. Keep in mind that we must take an active role in educating candidates about the issues. (Contrary to what many think, candidates do not know everything.) Make time to go to a community meeting with candidates and ask, "What are your plans to prepare children for kindergarten through accessible, affordable and quality care?" If they are unprepared to answer such a question, make time to meet with them and discuss the needs of children and share with them your professional experience. What children truly need are both educated candidates and voters.

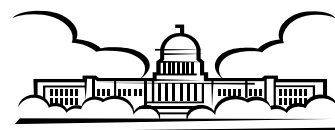
At the end of the 2008 Unicameral session, only one bill seemed to stand out as far as early childhood education and that was Legislative Bill (LB) 1153. This bill was introduced by Senator Adams to change provisions relating to early childhood education endowment funds. LB 1153 was gutted and amended to include the provisions of LB 1125 that pertain to the early childhood endowment and education grant program for at-risk children, birth to age three. The provisions clarify that only earnings from the private endowment for early childhood education are to be deposited in the Early Childhood Education Cash Fund and also require the earnings to be deposited at least annually rather than quarterly.

The bill provides for the use of up to 10%, rather than 5%, of funds in the Early Childhood Grant Program for evaluation and technical assistance. Assuming annual funding of \$2-\$3 million for the program, the bill provides for up to \$200,000-\$300,000 of cash funds, rather than \$100,000-\$150,000 of cash funds to be used for evaluation and technical assistance. The change will decrease by \$100,000-\$150,000, the amount that may be provided as grants for early childhood programs. This bill eliminates the eligibility of education service units to receive early childhood grants.

Language was also added to allow a one-year exception to allow kindergarten age children to enroll in early childhood education programs if they do not receive NDE Early Childhood grant or TEEOSA funds for four year olds. Governor Heineman approved LB 1153 on April 17, 2008.

Also this summer as you contemplate whom you will vote for this fall, you can follow along with an interim study at the Unicameral. Legislative Resolution (LR) 292, introduced by Senator Adams, will review Nebraska's current landscape of support for families with children age birth to five years who are at risk of failure in school and to advise on ways in which Nebraska can further support families and the positive development of children in their first five years. The issues to be addressed by this study shall include the following:

1. Identify the strengths and gaps in quality services for at-risk children age birth to five years;
2. Identify the status of current funding invested in at-risk children age birth to five years and potential funding sources that could ensure full funding of age birth to five years services, quality support, and accountability;
3. An analysis of other states' funding in early childhood; and
4. Other issues as deemed pertinent by the committee.

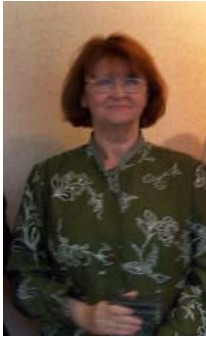
Head Start State Champions Recognized
